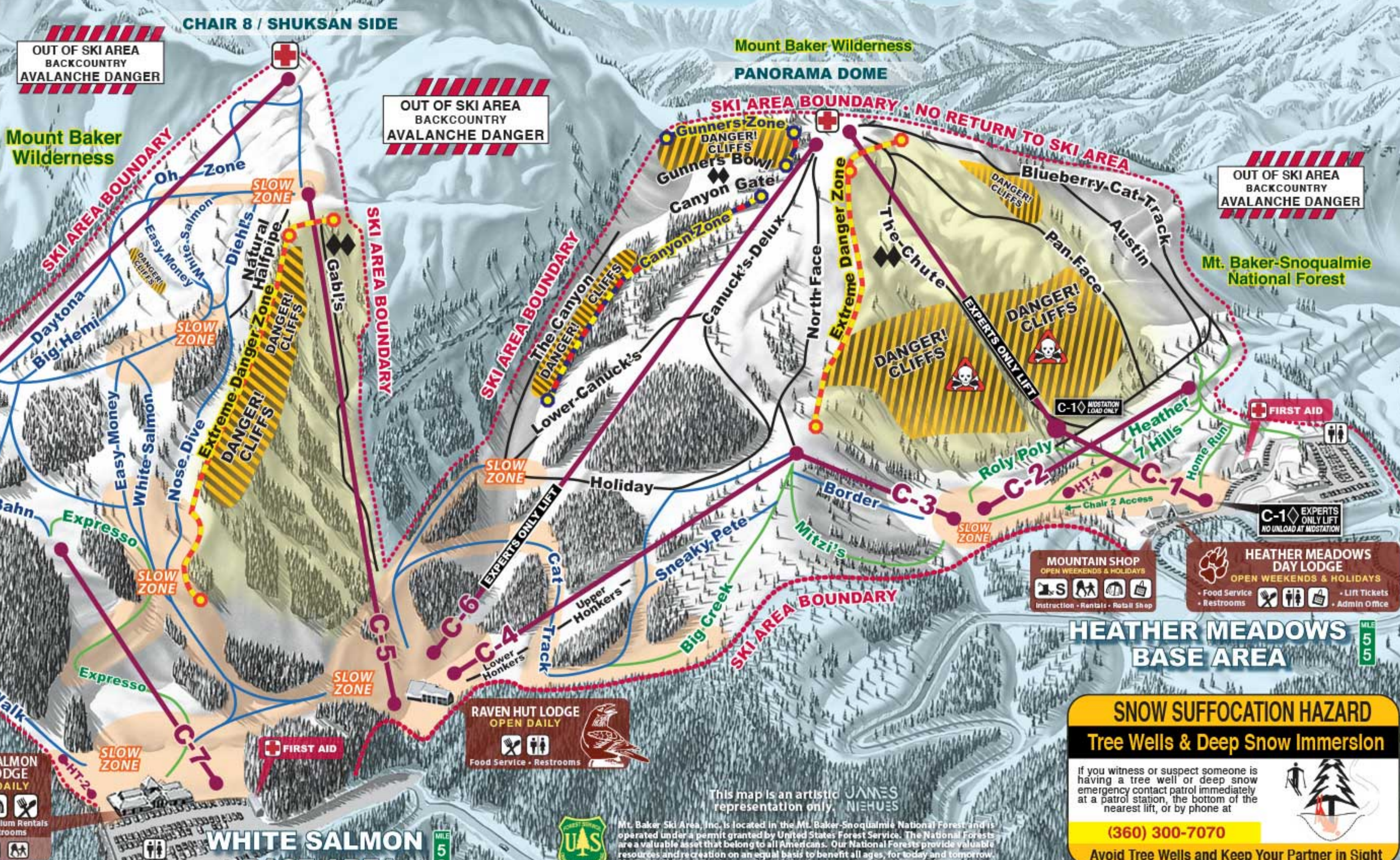

Avoid Tree Wells and Keep Your Partner in Sight

TREE WELL & DEEP SNOW SAFETY

- Always ski or ride with a partner, and STAY IN VISUAL CONTACT.
- Avoid skiing or snowboarding near trees.
- Assume all trees have hazardous tree wells.
- Skiing and riding on groomed runs is recommended to help avoid tree wells & deep snow hazards.

WARNING: RISK OF AVALANCHES

While snow safety and avalanche mitigation efforts by Mt. Baker Ski Area help reduce the risk of avalanches, snow slides and avalanches may occur inside and outside of posted boundaries at ski areas. **AVALANCHES ARE AN INHERENT RISK OF THE SPORT** due to the characteristics of snow and its variable nature in the ever-changing mountain environment. You are responsible for becoming educated about snow safety and using this education to reduce the risk of injury or death from avalanches through your actions and awareness.

WASHINGTON STATE RCW 79a.45.030

In addition to other responsibilities and codes of conduct, Washington Law RCW 79A.45.030 provides that anyone skiing outside of the confines of designated trails or runs open for skiing within the ski area boundary shall be responsible for any injuries or losses resulting from his or her action. Designated trails and runs are identified on the trail map. Areas bordering and between designated trails or runs are not designated trails or runs. It is your responsibility to know and follow all Mountain Policies. Information is available on the back of this Mt. Baker Trail Map, on our website at www.mtbaker.us, and posted at the ski area.
